SAVE A LIFE

We all play a part in stopping opioid overdose. Prevent a death by taking action now.

- ✓ BE PREPARED. If a family member or friend uses opioids, have naloxone (or Narcan) on hand in case of overdose. Naloxone (or Narcan) is a prescription medicine that reverses an opioid overdose by blocking the opioid receptors in the brain. It helps a person wake up from overdose and begin breathing again. Ask your Tribal behavioral health provider, law enforcement, health provider, pharmacy, or a syringe exchange how to obtain Naloxone.
- CHECK FOR SIGNS. A person who has overdosed will have slow or no breathing, unconsciousness, blue lips or fingernails, and cool skin that is ashy and pale.
