WHAT IS AN OPIOID?

Opioid pain medications prescribed by doctors include oxycodone, hydrocodone, codeine, morphine, and many others. Heroin is also considered an opioid.¹ These drugs can be highly addictive.

- 75 percent of opioid misuse starts with people using medication that wasn't prescribed for them – usually taken from a friend or family member.²
- Opioids are a leading cause of injury-related deaths in Washington State. More people die from overdose than from car crashes.³
